

RECTOR'S LETTER

We have certainly faced challenges during this deadly COVID-19 virus, but even so, many inspiring ministries here at St. John's of Lattingtown continue to grow and provide healing and care to countless individuals and families across the North Shore of Nassau County.

As we prepare for the future, let us move forward from these difficult days with a strong dose of humility. There is much that is impossible to predict, but as the prophet Jeremiah says, "God has plans for you, plans to prosper you and give you hope." Part of what the Bible teaches us about God is that the future is inextricably linked to the past. Jesus, the Messiah, did not arrive out of nowhere. The coming Savior had been prophesied for centuries and was the culmination of the law and the prophets.

And so, the future that God intends for us at St. John's will be new, but it will also grow out of what has been. It will build on a foundation that has been laid by us, by God's grace, and by those who came before us. With every new ministry we have considered since I began in May 2015, I have asked this simple question: "is this just something I want to do, or is it consistent with who St. John's is, and has been?" My prayer is that what we have done together will continue to be aligned with our mission, with our history, and with God's call, and therefore will be a solid foundation for what is to come as we learn and grow from this difficult period.

So, let's take a honest look at some of our challenges. I begin with this fact: there is a religious drought in our wider culture. All mainline Christian denominations are in the midst of major decline. Each new generation is becoming less religious than the one before it, with the "spiritual but not religious" category the fastest growing. Like a drought in the natural world, this religious drought is taking hold gradually and is sometimes hard to perceive. St. John's, like most churches, has fewer people attending Sunday worship (though a lot are engaged in ministry during the week); patterns of attendance are changing (among our hectic family lives, attendance once a month or even less frequently is common). How will we pass on the faith to the next generation, when many are less present, and less likely to be open to the gospel message in an increasingly secular culture?

Related to the religious drought, there are fewer people making pledges of financial support. With fewer people attending worship, and with the newer generations being less likely to pledge, we are relying on fewer people for financial support. Fortunately, the dollar amounts pledged have been fairly consistent over recent years. But this may not last.

What are the possible strategies to meet these challenges? Continue to strengthen what God is showing us is working. For example, our choral scholar program will continue to reach children, youth and college age students who might never enter our doors. With continued financial support from Opera Night and other means, our talented Director of Music Ministry Chris Brayne will help lead us to become an even more transformative parish, and a serious diocesan leader. I imagine St. John's of Lattingtown one day being mentioned in the same breath as the chorister programs at The Cathedral of the Incarnation in Garden City, and St. Thomas', New York. Our acolyte program must be stronger. Our Sunday school program is innovative but needs volunteers. Mother Catherine and Courtney Callahan will continue to expand outreach ministries. NOSH has taken us to another level and out into our changing neighborhoods. We ask - who are our neighbors? And what might they need that we can offer? Strengthening discipleship focuses not so much on numbers, as on the holy habits that change lives.

It took only 12 people around Jesus to change the world. When we make committed disciples of Jesus, they make a difference everywhere they go and attract others through Evangelism. That was Jesus' strategy, and it turned out pretty well. Encourage all members to help grow our endowment. A top priority this year will be to grow the St. John's endowment to withstand the cultural changes all around us. This comes largely through bequests from our faithful members. We need every pledging member to prayerfully consider an increase. Let us celebrate the things which have made St. John's who we are for decades: our marvelous nursery school, our incredible traditional music program, our "big tent" that welcomes all, and so on. Double down on what makes us unique, instead of imitating what other churches do. Invest in small groups. More than almost anything, being in a small group with "soul friends" has the potential to change our life. This can be a hard sell for Episcopalians, but the mega churches are right that a small group is essential to growing in faith, in addition to Sunday worship.

This is how we can combat the loneliness epidemic, through connection. Very soon, it will be time to launch a capital campaign to refresh the church in critical areas and double our endowment.

I've gone on far too long, and if you are still reading this, you deserve a prize! Nevertheless, I look forward to attacking these challenges with you in the year ahead with a lot of prayer and patience. Let me close by saying thank you for the opportunity to continue to serve as your Rector. Thank you to my family, the Bishop, our Curate and lay staff, to our Vestry, committees and volunteers, and especially to our tremendous Wardens and Treasurer for your leadership.

As we move forward and strive to provide spiritual nourishment to as many as possible, the plan is to continue our online worship offerings - which are easily accessed on our website or social media.

Never missing an opportunity to reach out to others in love, Courtney Callahan - aka Miss Courtney our beloved Director of Children's Ministry & Outreach - continues to inspire us with her indomitable spirit! Because of the pandemic, many here on Long Island found themselves with insufficient food. In response to this overwhelming need, Courtney, along with other church and community leaders, worked to create Nosh. Nosh has since become a program of The North Shore Soup Kitchen, and together these organizations - with the help of many St. Johns and community volunteers of all ages - provide weekly meals to literally hundreds in our community. Thank you Miss Courtney and to all who assist in this effort! In addition to Outreach, Courtney continues to engage and inspire our children with creative, fun crafts and opportunities to serve.

Recently we have said goodbye to two beloved staff members - our Curate Stephen Tamke who is currently serving as Priest-in-Charge at Christ Church Manhasset, and our Sexton, Kate Scefonas, who has taken over her family florist shop in Locust Valley. Needless to say their departure left us with some big shoes to fill, however Frank Powers, a current parishioner with wonderful experience has graciously volunteered to be our new Sexton. On August 15th, we welcomed Rev. Catherine Wieczorek and her family to the Gatehouse. Blessings abound, even in the midst of a worldwide pandemic! This is an exciting time in the life of our Parish and I look forward to the year ahead, as we grow in strength and numbers to expand our ministries.

Without the ongoing support of our faithful and generous parishioners, none of this would be possible. By the grace of God, and the generosity of our church family and friends, St. Johns is not only alive and well - we are thriving! This is also due in large part to the incredible Vestry, Ministry leaders and staff with whom I have had the privilege to work with in the past several years. Special thanks to Fr. Mark, our Rector and leader, George Stimola, Treasurer, Mary Savin, Parish Administrator, Mary Syracuse, Financial Administrator, Harold Bollaci, head of Buildings & Grounds, and Jay Aston, Warden - many hands make light work, as they say, and you all do more than a lions share!

An additional heartfelt thank you to our outgoing Vestry members: Carlyle Dunaway, George Stimola and Clerk, Mike Powers. A special note of deep appreciation to retiring Warden, Vicki Fox. It is the tireless service and dedication of this committed group of parishioners that is the lifeblood of St. John's Church.

2019 - 2020 MINISTRY HIGHLIGHTS - St. John's of Lattingtown

The Music Program- we continued with our popular Choral Scholar program, (for high school and college students) Evensong events, and Opera Night, as well as Coffee, Tea and Tunes Sunday Series. This year, the Junior Choral Scholar Program (ages 3rd grade and up) began with the children and youth at Glen Gardens Housing Project. We also hosted a weekend with internationally acclaimed composer Bob Chilcott for the St John's Choral Scholars, The Cathedral Choir, and the choirs of Herricks and Greenvale Schools, that concluded with a Gala Concert at the Cathedral of the Incarnation in Garden City. In conjuction with The New Member Committee and Little Learner's Nursery School the first "Singing Squad" music program for toddlers also began in 2019.

Little Learner's Nursery School- continues to grow and adjust to the ever changing needs of our community, including summer and after-school programs as well as online offerings.

Outreach Ministries- Thistle and Spoon and Friends of St John's served our friends and neighbors at the Men's Shelter and beyond. Our "Pies and Fries", Backpack Giveaway, Movie Night and Old Fashioned Christmas with our friends at Glen Gardens are tremendously popular events. This year, Courtney Callahan established a new thriving program called NOSH, a community organization of many volunteers formed during the COVID-19 Pandemic to serve the food insecure on the North Shore of LI. This organization expanded into a youth internship program and NOSHKids as well as other initiatives to support our neighbors.

St John's 66th Annual Fall Fair Our annual event continues to support community awareness and raise funds for many parish and local programs. In 2019, we added many new vendors and a co-sponsored Saturday event with the Grenville Baker Boys & Girls Club families.

Third Annual Opera Night in memory of Brian Kenneth Tully a wonderful night of great music and fellowship helped raised funds for the mission and ministries of St. John's, held December 6, 2019.

New Spiritual Enrichment opportunities –After the pandemic, we adapted to include online Sunday Services (until July 5th), Morning Prayer, Wednesday Prayers and Meditations, Zoom Coffee Hour and an online book club collaborating with several Episcopal churches both locally and beyond to discuss current racial developments and issues.

Sunday School – we continued with our traditional Sunday mornings and Sunday Night Lights Sunday School for all ages and transitioned to online crafts, hymns and offerings during the COVID crisis.

BUILDINGS AND GROUND IMPROVEMENTS

Church – beautiful new green altar frontal and pulpit falls (donated by the Staniford Family in memory of Noni Staniford) as well as traditional oil candles (donated by Donna & John George) now adorn our church altar.

Memorial Garden- final landscaping and planting was completed to our beloved place of rest and reflection to include the spectacular Davison Fountain as a focal point.


Playground – The Brian K. Tully Memorial Playground- a completely new state of the art playground installed and beautifully landscaped for the children of our nursery school and community.

The Barn- a trendy and highly successful thrift and consignment store developed by Kate Scefonas. She renovated what was once a dusty 100-year-old storage area into a charming thrift store that continues to be a tremendous asset for our congregation.


Brick Wall Renovation- after an accident left our Lattingtown Rd wall in shambles, a full renovation project to open up the space and restore what was salvageable from the original brick work with the addition of black fencing.

In March 2020, Courtney Callahan began a new community ministry NOSH– feeding over 500 families in response to the COVID crisis












Other music offerings in 2019 included *Tea*, Coffee and Tunes series (above), a workshop with
